The school community continues to enjoy a huge array of sporting, musical and drama opportunities. Already we are planning our Senior production of Les Miserables, and the House competition calendar is now in full swing. The wonderful array of competitions and trips, both academic and cultural, continues at full pace. I cannot list them all but rest assured that Olympiads, Chess competitions, Quizzes, University Lectures, Debating, Mock interviews, Duke of Edinburgh expeditions, Languages homestays, and more continue apace.

We recently welcomed parents of Y7, Y10 and Y12 in to school for updates on the next phase of their children's school journey and I am grateful for all the support you give us in encouraging your children to engage with the full offering at Camp Hill Boys. I am also grateful for the parents who attended our recent Parent Focus Group on the subject of safeguarding, and your response to the recent Online Safety parents event has been extraordinary.

In our Prize Giving ceremony, I spoke about the importance of being a discerning consumer of data and information, particularly when searching online or engaging with the potentially pernicious and addictive social media algorithms, and I am grateful for all parents who reinforce these messages. We are not saying that all online activity is unhelpful or dangerous, but we are clear that we need to work together to promote the safer use of the internet for young people.

Whilst I am here, I want to give a thank you message for all those who have supported the Association of Friends of the School (AFS) and their efforts to engage with the parent body, to support school events, and to raise funds to support the students' development. You are a generous and positive group who really go beyond the call of duty and I thank you for all you do. In particular, can I remind all parents to make donations to the pre-loved uniform campaign when your child out-grows their uniform or PE kit.

This summer the school took further steps to achieve our sustainability mission by installing solar panels on our flat roof spaces and we are anticipating reductions in our ecological footprint as well as energy cost savings. We also secured a grant to install charging points for electric vehicles thus promoting more sustainable travel for our staff and visitors. We have also completed the installation of the new outdoor food serving facility, lovingly christened by the students as "The Shack" although I have heard other phrases apparently involving the name Bowen and Burgers.

Our Development Office has been organising more old boy tours and reunions, more recently welcoming the class of 2014 and from 1982! We are really keen to welcome all of our alumni to visit the school and I find it very rewarding showing our former students around their Alma Mater. Please encourage the older students to sign up for the alumni newsletter before they leave the school next summer as we love to keep in touch. Please also spread the news that we will be hosting our first Alumni Dinner for some years on 15th March 2025.

I have regular meetings with our project management team for the new Camp Hill Community Hub and I am pleased to report that good progress has been made. You will remember that this new building will be situated on the bank next to the 1st XV rugby pitch and it will provide much needed classrooms, toilets, changing rooms and dining space. Below I have included an artist's impression of what it might look like and I commend the design's homage to the industrial heritage of Birmingham. We are very excited, and we remain hopeful that, if all goes to plan, we might be able to start using the new building in September of 2026.



Our fundraising target of £4.5m in order to complete both the building and a new all-weather pitch is now tantalisingly within reach. Recent very generous gifts from alumni and parents mean that we have now achieved a total of £3.7m. It is heart-warming to see how much our current families and former students value the experience that Camp Hill Boys offers and every gift, no matter how small, counts! Please spread the word about our fundraising campaign, and even if you don't feel that you can support us with a monetary donation, please let others know about this fantastic and much needed project.

It has been a busy term, and it remains for me to wish you all a wonderful Christmas Holiday. I hope you all manage to enjoy some peace and happiness and some quality family time, and that you all manage to stay safe and well, and I look forward to another exciting term in January.

German Homestay

At 3:55am on the (early) morning of the 25th September 2024, a group of excited Year 9 students gathered at the Lufthansa check-in desks within Birmingham Airport. They were preparing to board LH959 to Frankfurt, ready to meet the very same exchange partners that visited them at home back in March of 2024. I, Omer Arshad, was one of them.

When we first arrived at Frankfurt Airport, there was a journey ahead of us to reach the suburb of Bergen-Enkheim, where we would meet our partners at their school, the Schule am Ried. To get there, we first embarked on the S-Bahn from the Airport to Konstablerwache, then headed on the U-Bahn to Enkheim, a railway line and station we would grow very familiar with throughout the week. From there, we walked to the school, were picked up by our partners and sat at home for the remainder of the day, unpacking our belongings and settling into our residences for the next week. However, a limited number of us were gifted with some laser tag for the evening.

On the second day of the homestay, we headed to the city centre of Frankfurt using the U-Bahn from Enkheim, and travelled to the top of the Helaba Tower, also known as Main Tower. From there, we were permitted to gaze at a picturesque view over Frankfurt. We could spot the main Hauptbahnhof (railway station) and even Frankfurt Airport, though it was difficult to see due to its distance from the city centre. After our gazing had concluded, we took a group photo and headed 55 floors back down to the ground. After a short walk to our meeting place, we were given 1 hour of free time within the city, but we didn't venture far within that time. We made our way to the MyZeil shopping centre, and rode the longest unsupported indoor escalator in Europe. On the top floor of the shopping centre, we found one of the cheapest ice creams in Frankfurt, only €2,50 for 2 scoops, an absolute bargain compared to the insane €7,60 being charged for Spaghettieis (spaghetti ice cream) at the shop in Bergen. The cheaper ice cream also unarguably tasted better.

Once our time at the city centre had ended, we went to Frankfurt zoo. However the rain was not kind to us there. We were so soaked that we could barely enjoy the place. However, despite the disruption to our trip, we did see many unique animals, including a lion and his wife, capybaras, various reptiles, penguins, zebras and a tiger!

After the zoo, we made our way back to the Schule am Ried and our partners took us back to our homes.

At home, we accustomed ourselves to the German way of living. We ate LOTS of bread. Germans love their Brot and their Brötchen. However, when we weren't eating bread, we were entertained by our partners. Me and Julius, my partner, found a collective passion for UNO, which we played very competitively. I beat him a few times, and he beat me a few times. He also taught me how to play Fortnite, a game he was obsessed with, yet a game I will probably never play again.

School starts much earlier than it does in England, and I found myself having to wake up consistently at around 6:45 am - very early!

German Homestay

Going to a foreign country is no easy task, for both students and teachers alike, but at 03:55 in the morning at the airport? That's when you start to feel *sorry* for the students (and teachers), but we appreciated the extra couple of hours in Germany, just as our exchanges enjoyed missing the day of school. I was greeted by my German exchange, Amelie, and tons of German chocolate and sweets. When we got there, sleep deprived and all, we went home for the first day, appreciating those extra hours. The German houses were much different from British ones, from Brotschneider (bread cutting machine) to windows that seemed to fall on you! The first day went amazingly, catching up with fellow exchange students, and playing highly competitive games of exploding kittens (just me), and enjoying the rest overall.

Then came the first day of activities, but myself and my partner were overcome by a setback never seen before, hyper-efficiency, yes that's right! Our bus arrived 10 minutes early and we missed it! After a few messages and phone calls though, we made it to Enkheim station just in time for the train to the zoo, which was amazing, with animals from all over the world, and a haven for, not just the animals, but us as humans, with birds free-roaming, and even a petting area! I can't miss out though the amazing Main Tower building, putting us on plane level with Frankfurt airport as well as being able to see the whole city. That is if the wind doesn't knock off your glasses!

On the Friday, we went to the Dialogmuseum, which was a museum for the blind. When I heard of this, I thought it was your everyday museum, but no. This museum made you blind (not really), it was pitch black and all you had was a blind stick, and your other senses. The museum taught you to use all of your senses, and also teaching you real situations like crossing the road or getting on a train. It was an amazing experience. Free time in the city centre was interesting, with many people going to Der M (McDonald's) while others (like myself) were caught going to a bakery by Dr Loghin, who bought everyone some authentic German bread.

On the weekend, people did many things, some people bumped into one another in cake shops. Most people, if not everyone, had some bread if they hadn't already, but my partner and I, along with a few others, made the trip out of Frankfurt to go to the Felsenmeer. Now if I was going to explain this in a few words, it was essentially a couple of rocks on a hill that you climbed, but that didn't stop us having a game of tag on the way up. The rain set in on the way down, which could have caused the game of tag to turn into a game of survival! We certainly didn't miss the British weather, as it was present in Germany half the time.

The trip was an amazing experience, and the advice I give to current year 7s or (maybe) year 8s, you should definitely go on this trip. It gives you an insight into the depth of German culture, but also gives you a friend for life. I will be back in Germany soon, eagerly waiting for the same experience.

Ritangle Challenge 2024

Over the last couple of months, a group of dedicated mathematicians competed in a mathematics competition called Ritangle (pronounced 'right angle' or 'wry tangle'), run by MEI. The competition consisted of 3 stages, with Stage 1 being released slowly over the two months.

Stage 1 began by releasing one question every week for 3 weeks, which left us hungry for more questions, which is when it changed to 3 questions a week for the remaining 6 weeks. This gave us 20 questions, each of which had an enthralling mathematical twist or challenge, and were incredibly fun to solve. These questions involved number theory, geometry and calculus.

Many participants engaged in an informal competition to solve the questions first, which created (un)healthy competition, driving each other to mathematical success. They were solved incredibly quickly, with members - notably Shubham Kumar, Adwaya Gupta and Zack Lai solving them in the morning - with intention to prevent Alex Hopkins from answering a single question in Ritangle.

On the final Friday, Stage 2 and 3 were released. This gave us 8 questions all at once, at 4pm. Initially, when we tried to log in and submit our answers, the website was down. Some lucky individuals had the questions saved on their screens, and kept working, but others were left in utter despair. Luckily this cleared up in 5 minutes, and we all took this break to munch on Domino's pizza, courtesy of the best maths teacher; we love you Mr Dowling! We proceeded to rush through these questions, solving all 8 in three-quarters of an hour, through epic teamwork and Desmos.

Stage 3 was password protected, and required a four digit code, obtained by solving all of stages 1 and 2, and then solving 4 crossnumber puzzles, which each provided us with the location of a city in the USA. The first letter of each would give us the code.

This was the first point of despair. The four crossnumbers each had their own team, and Team Q and S solved theirs pretty much immediately. Due to some organizational awfulness, team P consisted of only one person, and hence it did not get solved at all. Team R, consisting of Kumayl, Raphael and Alex, managed to only solve to find the longitude of the city, but with aid from Google Maps, Arnav and Raph managed to pinpoint Louisville.

With 3 of the crossnumbers being solved, and by sheer ingenuity Raphael managed to spot that the final letter was N - from the word RiTaNgLe - yielding the code RTNL.

Stage 3 involved solving three much larger crossnumber puzzles, each with its own mathematical focus. The first crossnumber was Number soup, which involved an in-depth knowledge of sequences many of us had never heard of before, such as lucky, happy, harshad, lucas and cullen numbers. The team focusing on this was Alex, Raph, Adwaya, and Kumayl. We had to print large lists of numbers and compare digits repeatedly, finding possibilities and brute forcing combinations until they yielded an issue. Unfortunately, we made assumptions and had to reprove certain possibilities, spending countless hours in a circular pattern. We managed to deduce half the grid and find 2 approaches to solving the rest of the grid in certain combinations by using the symmetry of the grid's clues. Eventually, Alex managed to find the final solution by disproving an earlier assumption and finding possibilities of the final clue.

Triangles, the second crossnumber, was focussed around triangles, triangular numbers, and primitive pythagorean triples. This was worked on by Taheen, Umair, Arnav and Shubham on the day. Umair found a numerical solution to the problem, which passed our "checks", but Shubham Kumar *to crack the puzzle by using insane logical reasoning and assumptions which lead them to complete everything. Astonishingly, this was the first puzzle the team solved, followed by Triangles, and then Number Soup.*

Overall, we managed to complete the entire competition, and await a judgement in our placements nationally. Fortunately, the questions were easier than last year, so we could all work on them feasibly. Gratitude must be stated for our Year 13 members, who are in the midst of University admission preparations.
