## Exam Results 2017 – The Boys Have Done Us All Proud Again!

Well done the GCSE and A Level classes of 2017.

## GCSE

- Nearly 9 out of 10 results (88%) were at A\* or A grade (or numbers 7-9 on the new grading).
- The Attainment 8 figure for the school was 81.7. In other words, on average, each student achieved the equivalent of 10 of the new grade 8s.
- The Progress 8 figure was an astonishing 1.01; that means that, on average, boys at Camp Hill performed a full grade better in every GCSE they took than boys of a similar Key Stage 2 ability across the country.
- According to The Times, only two state schools in the country did better at GCSE (%A\*) than Camp Hill.

### A Level

- More than two-thirds (68%) of A Levels were passed at grade A or A\*; more than a quarter (29%) were at A\*.
- 17 boys had at least 4 A Levels at grade A or A\*.
- According to The Times, just 8 state schools in the country had better (A\*%) A Level results than Camp Hill.

#### Other successes

- 26 boys won places to study medicine a new school record (following the record number 24 – last year).
- One boy represented the UK in the team of 4 in the International Chemistry Olympiad in Thailand. He returned with a silver medal. (A different boy represented the country in 2016; he came back with a bronze medal.)
- One boy has been chosen to represent the UK in the International Astrophysics Olympiad (also in Thailand) in November 2017.

These headline figures tell only part of the story. We are thrilled for every boy who has, through commitment and hard work, achieved the very best results he could. We congratulate you all.

These funds were used to provide eligible students with:

- a grant to cover the cost of the school uniform;
- a grant to cover travel costs to and from school;
- subsidies to provide access to the full range of curricular trips and visits available.

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These funds ensured, in this selective school where pupils travel longer than average distances to school, access to the school on a daily basis. They helped the pupils and their families to meet the school's strict uniform requirements and ensured they could take part in the broad and balanced educational curriculum. Pupils claiming Pupil Premium funding were thus supported so that they had equal access to the opportunities available to pupils of the school.

From September 2015 the school will also allow Pupil Premium/16-19 Bursary Funding to support the purchase of:

- Sports Kit
- Curriculum equipment e.g. aprons for DT/Science, calculator/stationery and paper;
- ICT laptop/printer and consumables, internet access (for sole use of pupil) owned/monitored by school;
- Trips/visits Curriculum, Rugby/Hockey/Football tours, Art, Battlefields, Outdoor Pursuits;

Sixth Form – as above plus support attendance at University Open Days – (transport/meal costs)

and re-sit examination cost;

Further support funded, in part, by the Pupil Premium and available to all pupils as required includes:

- English as an Additional Language provision specialist support available one day per week;
- counselling services (time available has tripled from 2012-13 from 2 hours per week to 6 hours
  - per week in response to increasing demand/needs of the pupils);
- pastoral support from a full time Learning Mentor;
- Salaries of Head of Year and Deputy Head (Pastoral) salaries who monitor and support pupil achievement (attainment and progress) of all pupils.

The academic attainment and progress (relative to baseline testing) of all pupils (including those on Free Schools Meals, Ever 6 Free School Meals, those with Special Educational Needs and those who receive language support) is monitored using the school's tracking system and annual examination performance evaluation system. Staff training is being delivered to improve staff awareness of closing the gap issues.

In 2016-2017 at GCSE nine were eligible FSM Pupil Premium funding. As a group they achieved 72% A\* and 96% A\*/B. Their results were:
